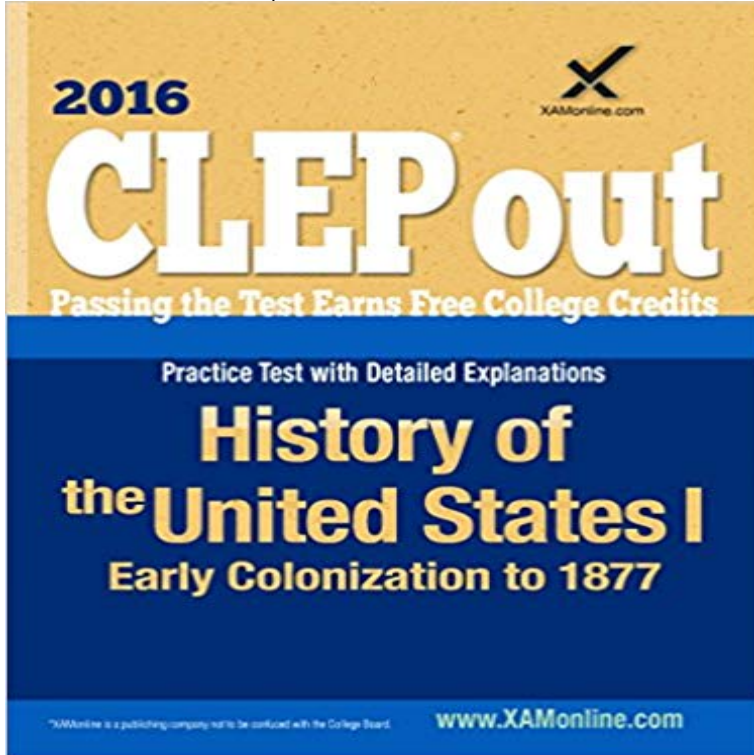


CLEP History of the United States I: Early Colonization to 1877
