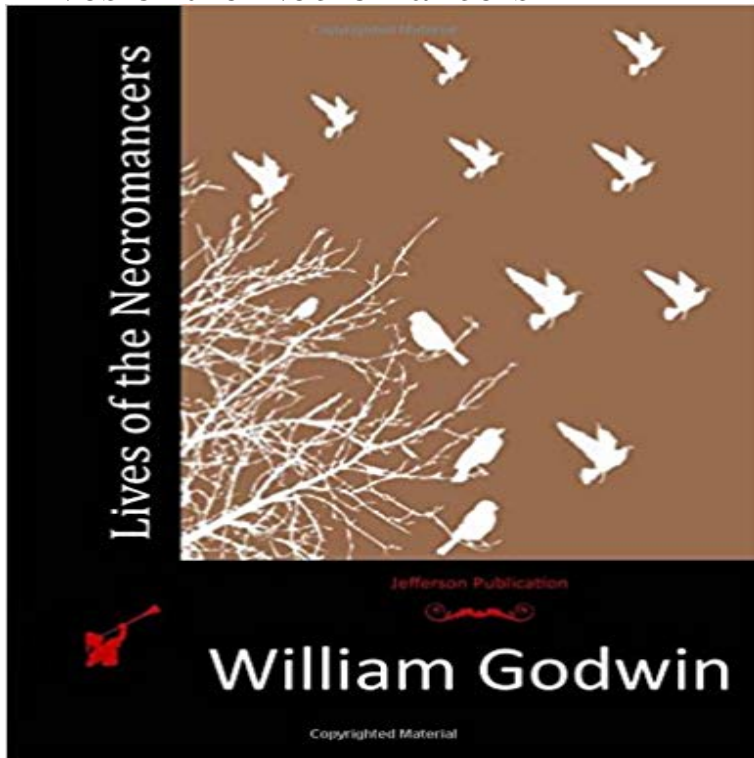


# Lives of the Necromancers
